

## Fellow International Educator,

Teachers are control freaks. I should know I was one.

I'm not saying control is wrong. Christian teachers are given an immense responsibility to lead students to learn, and that means controlling and owning the space and everything that goes on in it: the wall decor, the plans, the pace, the tone, the subject matter, the assessments, the order, and discipline – in other words, every minute of every class. All of this requires excellent planning and execution.

Of course, this is good and right. And let's not forget what a privilege it is to teach about God and His great world. However, for someone as driven as me, that level of control and ownership without limits can go sideways. Due to the skills I first developed in the classroom, I was soon invited up the leadership ladder at Black Forest Academy, assuming one leadership role after another. This eventually culminated in my appointment as Director in my 12th year of service. All was going well until... about four years into headship, my freakish levels of control finally caught up with me, and I had a stress-related collapse.

The short version of that collapse is that while I was doing a good job, I was attempting to control and own too much to the point where I was working hard for God but leaving little left for Him. Eventually, I was sidelined for several months with a bout of vertigo, exacerbated by exhaustion.





This sidelining turned out to be a tremendous gift. You can read the <u>entire story</u> and what I learned at <u>my blog</u>, but let me share this one quick lesson with you.

While on a solo retreat during my months of recovery, I became very aware of how controlling I was and how, by owning everything, I was leaving little time for prayer and God. This was when I started to pray differently. 1) Every morning, I began by returning the school I led back to God, reminding Him, as Moses did in Exodus 33:12-13, that these people, this school, were His, not mine. 2) I also started to open my hands, palms up, imagining the school resting in my hands and, as David did in Psalm 142:1-2, lifting it all to God, saying aloud, "It's not mine, it's yours. I give it back to you. Help me to serve you and your people well." This was a significant part of my healing, as I put God back in charge of my work and life.

How about you? Before your appropriate control and ownership cross a line, take time daily to lift your classroom, your department, and your responsibilities to God and give them back to Him and rest in His peace.



# **An Exemplary Example: Dalat International School**

There are a handful of impressive, unique, and defining qualities of Dalat International School (DIS) in Penang, Malaysia: it boasts a nearly 100-year history, it is no longer in the city it is named after, and maybe most school can successfully notably, it is ACSI's first international school to earn exemplary accreditation status.

DIS was a boarding school for missionary kids when it was founded in 1929 in Dalat, Vietnam, by the Christian and Missionary Alliance. In 1965, with the Vietnam War raging, the U.S. military gave the school 48 hours to pack up everything they could and head to Thailand.

"We still have a number of alumni who remember those days," said Shawna Wood, the Head of School at DIS. 'evac-pack.'"

After six months sharing space with an international school in Thailand, the school moved to Malaysia. Within a few years, administrators realized a return to Vietnam would never materialize. They moved to Penang in 1971, rented a campus from a convent, and have remained there ever since.

The last few decades have not included as many chaotic changes, but that has allowed the school to grow in other ways.

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#### The Ideal Portrait of a Christian High School Graduate Continued

An individual's character, work ethic, and academic abilities are not fully developed at the age of 18, and maturity is a lifelong process. However, there are fundamental training strategies that can enhance the likelihood of a child adopting a desired belief system, cultivating effective learning habits, and embodying Christ-like character traits. While parents are the primary influencers in shaping these qualities, schools also play a significant role in their development.

Every graduating senior is a unique creation in the image of God, yet schools aim to instill certain desired outcomes in all of them. During my time as head of school at Prestonwood Christian Academy in Texas, we prayerfully aspired for our graduating seniors to demonstrate the foundational desired outcomes listed below:

- 1. Reverence for God is the beginning point of wisdom (Proverbs 9:10). Without reverence and recognition of God, then education is essentially secular. Learning to think and discern (Hebrews 5:14) as a mature believer in Christ is undergirded by authentic respect and love for our Lord.
- 2. An Eternal Perspective is interdependent with reverence. This type of perspective gives us purpose in our work, and it develops a strong work ethic because we know and understand that we are working to please and honor God (Colossians 3:23). The Latin phrase on our school crest, Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam (for God's greater glory), frames our motives.
- 3. Humility is then cultivated when one recognizes that our lives are about Him; we are a 'serving-as-His' leader. Recognizing that God has bestowed intellect, talents, and gifts upon us takes the focus off us and rightfully places it on our Lord. This compels us to demonstrate the love and attitude of Jesus Christ to all people, characterized by selflessness, servanthood (Philippians 2:2–11), and a lifestyle of obedience to seeking first the Kingdom of God (Matthew 6:33).

- 4. The process of learning, or scholarship, is conditioned by reverence, eternal perspective, and humility. The Christian liberal arts environment nurtures the mind to become eager to learn, think, and analyze. All knowledge and every academic discipline are appreciated, and not for a 'grade' per se, but because of the very process of learning—scholastic excellence becomes a commitment to disciple the mind. Using our mind to not only magnify God but to serve as His ambassador in areas of law, business, medicine, engineering, education, ministry, and any assignment God calls us to is an act of obedience and reverence. The development of a biblical worldview is the fruit of this process.
- 5. Rigor, high expectations, and accountability complement the entire learning environment as students grow accustomed to striving for excellence. Problem-solving, thinking, critical analysis, and synthesis strengthen the mind and become natural thought processes. The apostle Paul encouraged the Corinthians to strengthen their minds (2 Corinthians 10:5), including all systems of philosophy, opinions, and powers of reason being subject to the Word of God. A culture of rigor serves as a catalyst to pursue excellence in every area of one's life

Schools, savor every moment of this celebration as we witness God's reflection in the eyes of each graduating senior. The memories of high school will forever hold a special place in their hearts. To the graduates: may your futures be as bright as your spirits, and may you always seek to glorify your Heavenly Father on whatever path He leads you!

## **An Exemplary Example Continued**

DIS has been accredited through ACSI since the 1980s, so the desire to become an exemplary accredited school was to push the school to another level.

"We always want to improve," Wood said, who is also on the ACSI Commission on Accreditation. "We decided it would give us direction for what things to change."

That sentiment proved to be true. As DIS made changes to meet exemplary accreditation status, the school leadership saw positive results.

"We needed to develop an evaluation and a growth program for all our staff, not just instructive and administrative staff," Wood said. "That was really needed. It helped everyone feel more supported. It made us go back and write detailed job descriptions and evaluation tools for every position."

The school also began focusing more on its alumni base and establishing better procedural documentation.

Now, Wood recommends that many schools should consider taking an additional challenge beyond the Inspire protocol.

"The exemplary protocol is a really good way to give you some ideas," Wood said. "There are a lot of requirements for your school board, your head of school, and your financial situation. It will really help with the long-term stability of your school."

Along with its academic excellence and growth mindset, the DIS leadership and community have stepped up in recent years to address much-needed campus improvements.

Most of the original buildings were completely demolished and replaced with new, state-of-the-art facilities that are a wonder to behold for any visitor and a significant boon to student achievement and engagement.

These include upgraded classrooms, a new high school building, a new middle school building, a new dormitory on the beachfront, and a state-of-the-art auditorium with seating for nearly 500.

These campus improvements not only complement DIS's Exemplary accreditation status but also enable them to host various Christian gatherings on their campus.

The first major conference to be hosted on campus is ACSI's International Christian Educator Conference (ICEC Asia), scheduled for November 2025.

ACSI is expecting 500 educators from member international schools across Asia to gather on DIS's beautiful campus for professional growth and spiritual enrichment. Dalat International School is blessed to be a blessing (Psalm 67:1-2).
