



The flame burned brightly on its watercolor backdrop—a symbol of hope, truth, and peace. Luigi, a kindergartener at Westminster Christian School, held up his artwork and his best-of-show ribbon with pride.

Attendees of Westminster Christian's Spring Fine Arts Night curled through the halls of the school, admiring student paintings, drawings, and cut-outs. Many of the student art pieces exhibited were top placers in the ACSI Art Festival, which the school participated in online.

Westminster has participated in the ACSI Art Festival for several years, but this particular year resulted in a special display of students glorifying God through their artistic talent.

ACSI Director of Student Leadership & Learning, Emily Pigott, shared a bit of history surrounding this popular event.

"The ACSI Art Festivals have been going on for more than 30 years," she said.
"They are designed to encourage fine art education, promote creativity and expression, and ultimately, to glorify Jesus. We typically have about 150 schools, both U.S. and international, participate."

Westminster Christian School, an accredited K-12 ACSI member, looks forward to participating in the event each year.

The school's elementary school art teacher, Jessi Luecht, shared that the school community has repeatedly chosen to host the art festival because it celebrates and affirms students as they discover their God-given gifts and abilities.

"As students create their works of art, they are able to see how they bring something unique and special to each piece because God has created them with intentionality as special and unique individuals," she said. "As an educator, it is my joy to encourage students to grow and develop as artists and point them back to their Creator."

Students at Westminster truly thrive in their fine arts class. In fact, Luigi's art submission for the ACSI Arts Festival has been featured on the 2023 ACSI Christmas card. The recipients of the Christmas card, both digitally and in print, include more than 2,000 schools.

Head of School Carlye Hay shared how proud she is of Luigi.



ACSI Introduces Vision 2030

ACSI is introducing a new vision for Christ-centered education. Vision 2030 is the next extension of the foundational strategic plan created in 2018 featuring the pillars of Advance, Access, and Advocacy and the six supporting anchors of prayer and God's Word, IT, HR, Communications, Thought Leadership and Finance/Advancement. ACSI is moves forward in bold and innovative ways not only responding to critical needs today but planning for the future of Christ-centered education tomorrow.

With many of the established goals from the 2018 Strategic Plan completed in 2022, the ministry leadership sought God's direction of how to go deeper between now and 2030. After 18 months of prayer and dialogue with Senior Staff, Leadership, All Staff, and through critical conversations including industry voices, growth initiatives were created.

In October, the ACSI Board endorsed these initiatives and encouraged the organization to move forward with more detailed planning. Vision 2030 proposes four irrelated growth initiatives including:

- 1) New Fields for Ministry—positioning ACSI to serve newly ripened fields of opportunity for children to access Christ-centered education.
- 2) Missional Partnerships—connecting ACSI with other organizations to leverage personnel and resources together for a greater missional impact.
- 3) Educational Resources & Programs—addressing the need for high-quality, biblically based educational resources and programs across the world.
- 4) Teacher and Leader Pipeline—addressing the current worldwide teacher shortage, as well as meeting future needs for more credentialed teachers and qualified leaders who are biblically trained for educational ministry.

In the coming months, ACSI will continue to seek and pray for God's continued wisdom and discernment as the organization crafts this God-sized vision into tangible tactics driven by God-honoring stewardship. Please join ACSI in praying for Vision 2030 knowing the work now will create momentum for the days to come. ACSI is excited for what the future holds knowing WHO holds the future.

Leadership U "A Blessing" for Mentor and Scholar Pairing by: Josh Worden

When Brandon Kline was approached by his head of school at Evansville Christian School in Indiana about participating in Leadership U, he knew it could be a valuable resource.

Leadership U is a 14-month program that provides support and learning experiences for early education leaders, principals, and new heads of school. The program is designed for people like Kline, who is in his second year as a middle school principal.

Kline was hesitant about committing to the program amidst a busy schedule, but he agreed to join. He was paired with a mentor, Tom Hughes, who serves as a Field Director in ACSI's Eastern Division.

"When we were first interviewing, I said, 'Tom, I'm not really sure if I have time for this.' And actually, it's been an extremely valuable resource," Kline said,

"Not only meeting with Tom but in terms of being able to review content that is sent out as far as different articles and resources to help us gather more information to be able to make wiser decisions."

The Leadership U program began with a week-long residency in Kansas City, Missouri, (at the Flourishing Schools Institute), and will conclude with a similar experience at the Leadership U training and graduation in Plano, Texas, in March of 2024.

"I really enjoyed the opportunity to work with other Leadership U mentees and mentors and to be able to talk to them, develop relationships, connections, and really just see how other schools are performing," Kline recounted of the first institute.

Kline meets regularly over Zoom with Hughes, who casts a wide net in the ways he provides support.

"We cover everything from strategic planning to communication skills, what's an effective team, what's a dysfunctional team, and conflict resolution," Hughes said. "The whole gamut of leadership, we cover."

Kline says he has trusted members of his staff in Indiana that he discusses decisions with, but he finds it helpful to have a voice outside of his school to run ideas by.

"It's been great to talk with him and share my decision-making, changes that I was looking into and investigating about student behavior, communication with parents, and so forth," Kline said. "Tom's done a great job as far as listening, asking 'what are your thoughts within that?' and then either affirming or also providing his insights. So I find that to all be very beneficial."

Kline's motivation in seeking out counsel came directly from Scripture. Jesus had His disciples and they sat there at His feet in order to learn," he said. "If you don't, especially as first-year teachers or administrators, look up and have someone to mentor you and lead you, you may get there eventually, but you'll have a lot more difficulties along the way. To have a mentor who not only is leading you and guiding you but is also doing that from a Biblical perspective is just a blessing."

Hughes said his motivation to give back is like other types of giving that are promoted more often, like tithing or serving at church. He believes that generosity should extend to helping others in a professional context.

"Brandon and people like him, they're right there with the students and teachers and board members," Hughes said. "They're there in the heat of the battle.

Anything we can do to help people, that's what we're called to do."

The program is only about halfway done, but Kline has already made up his mind that his decision to join was a good one.

"I would encourage any leader in Christian education to take the time to invest in a leader and a mentor, both ways," he said. "Leadership U provides that investment, and that investment will always be worth it. I'm very thankful that I've chosen to take that investment and that Tom agreed to be my mentor. And I want to come out the other side a lot better for it."
